Twinning for tomorrow's world

hough bilateral relations between European towns date back to Ancient Greece, the concept of town twinning arises mainly from the experience of the two 20th century World Wars, when hundreds of European towns decided that developing grassroots, people to people, relations, across old national frontiers, was an essential way of building a peaceful Europe. And when the Council of European Municipalities and Regions was created in 1951, its members ensured that town twinning became a permanent, structured pan European movement. Later, in 1988, following CEMR's action, the European Union created the community programme for town twinning, thus providing financial support to twinning.

Today, some 30,000 twinnings bring together towns from over 30 European countries, helping to create a Europe of citizens. Twinning gets citizens involved in concrete actions, and promotes the coming together of, and mutual respect between, the peoples of Europe.

In today's fast-changing world, much twinning action is based on exploring and exchanging ideas on specific themes and issues. Social inclusion, economic development, and the protection of our environment and cultural heritage are just a few of the areas in which twinning can play an important role. By establishing solid relationships of trust between towns and cities with diverse cultures and backgrounds, twinning provides an ideal framework for the exchange of experiences. These ties can thus make up a basis for the development of technical cooperation which allows for efficient responses to the problems faced by every European local government.

Twinning in the 21st century allows, thanks to new technologies, for networking and greater interaction between the citizens of Europe. These involve a broad base of actors from local life, the organisations of civil society, schools, universities and the private sector as well, involving citizens in their cities' projects. By promoting East-West links, as well as between the North and the South of Europe, twinning strengthens European cohesion. Twinning with partners in south-east Europe can help to develop peace and democracy in that region, paving the way for possible EU membership. Last but not least, by opening up to non-European countries, twinning contributes to peace and mutual understanding with our neighbours, particularly in the Mediterranean region, but also more broadly with our partners in developing countries.

The involvement of European cities and their citizens is crucial for a collective response to the new challenges of the day. This contribution will be made possible by innovative and ambitious twinning actions, responding to the major issues facing us all in tomorrow's world.

The city of Rhodes



At the crossroads of three continents Rhodes has known many civilizations throughout its 3,000-year history - from the ancient Greeks and the Romans, followed by the Byzantines, the Knights of St. John, the Ottomans, and the Italians.

Many are the monuments in Rhodes which are evidence of its rich and varied past, the most well-known and best preserved of which is the Medieval Town. The seat of the Knights of St. John of Jerusalem in the 14th and 15th centuries, it is the largest walled Medieval Town in Europe and was inscribed on UNESCO's World Heritage List in 1988.

Rhodes has managed to combine its history and multicultural character with contemporary infrastructure in the modern urban center to become one of the most important tourist and conference destinations in Greece, having hosted major events including the EU Summit in 1988.
